#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Members of the Board of Trustees:

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Goodrich Independent School District (District), as of and for the year ended August 31, 2010, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the District's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and the significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the District, as of August 31, 2010, and the respective changes in financial position, thereof and the respective budgetary comparison for the General Fund for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated November 12, 2010, on our consideration of the District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis, as listed in the table of contents, be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the District's financial statements as a whole. The other supplementary information is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations, and is also not a required part of the financial statements. The other supplementary information and the schedule of expenditures of federal awards are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information, excluding the Fund Balance and Cash Flow Calculation Worksheet (Exhibit J-3), has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information, excluding the Fund Balance and Cash Flow Calculation Worksheet (Exhibit J-3), is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole. The Fund Balance and Cash Flow Calculation Worksheet (Exhibit J-3), as listed in the table of contents, has not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on it.

#### Management's Discussion and Analysis

As management of the Goodrich Independent School District (District), we offer readers of the District's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the District for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2010.

#### **Financial Highlights**

- The assets of the District exceeded its liabilities at the close of the most recent fiscal year by \$3,765,800 (net assets). Of this amount, \$1,829,511 (unrestricted net assets) may be used to meet the District's ongoing obligations to students and creditors.
- The District's total net assets decreased by \$3,946.
- As of the close of the current fiscal year, the District's governmental funds reported combined ending fund balances of \$1,648,588, a decrease of \$125,655 in comparison with the prior year.
- At the end of the current fiscal year, unreserved fund balance for the general fund was \$500,449, or 19
  percent of total general fund expenditures.
- The District's bonds and notes payable decreased by \$98,206 (44 percent) during the current fiscal year.

#### **Overview of the Financial Statements**

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the District's basic financial statements. The District's basic financial statements comprise three components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements, and 3) notes to the financial statements. This report also contains other supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves.

Government-wide financial statements. The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the District's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business.

The Statement of Net Assets presents information on all of the District's assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as net assets. Over time, increases or decreases in net assets may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the District is improving or deteriorating.

The Statement of Activities presents information showing how the District's net assets changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in net assets are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods (e.g., uncollected taxes and earned but unused sick leave).

The government-wide financial statements of the District are principally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues (governmental activities). The governmental activities of the District include Instruction, Instructional Resources and Media Services, Curriculum and Staff Development, School Leadership, Guidance, Counseling, and Evaluation Services, Health Services, Student Transportation, Food Service, Cocurricular/Extracurricular Activities, General Administration, Plant Maintenance and Operations, Data Processing Services, Interest on Long-term Debt, Current Debt Fees, Payments Related to Shared Service Arrangements, and Other Intergovernmental Charges.

The government-wide financial statements can be found as noted in the table of contents of this report.

**Fund financial statements.** A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The District, like other state and local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. All of the funds of the District can be divided into two categories: governmental funds and fiduciary funds.

Governmental funds. Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements, governmental fund financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources, as well as on balances of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating a District's near-term financing requirements.

Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for *governmental funds* with similar information presented for *governmental activities* in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the District's near-term financing decisions. Both the governmental fund balance sheet

and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities.

The District maintains 19 individual governmental funds. Information is presented separately in the governmental fund balance sheet and in the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances for the general fund and the Summer Youth Program/DETCOG special revenue fund, which are both considered to be major funds. Data from the other 17 governmental funds are combined into a single, aggregated presentation.

The District adopts an annual appropriated budget for its general fund. A budgetary comparison statement has been provided for the general fund to demonstrate compliance with this budget.

The basic governmental fund financial statements can be found as noted in the table of contents of this report.

**Fiduciary funds.** Fiduciary funds are used to account for resources held for the benefit of students. Fiduciary funds are *not* reflected in the government-wide financial statement because the resources of those funds are *not* available to support the District's own programs. The accounting used for fiduciary funds is similar to the accounting used for proprietary funds.

The basic fiduciary fund financial statements can be found as noted in the table of contents of this report.

**Notes to the financial statements.** The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements. The notes to the financial statements can be found as noted in the table of contents of this report.

**Other information.** In addition to the basic financial statements and accompanying notes, this report also presents other supplementary information which includes schedules required by the Texas Education Agency. Other supplementary information can be found as noted in the table of contents of this report.

#### **Government-wide Financial Analysis**

As noted earlier, net assets may serve over time as a useful indicator of a District's financial position. In the case of the District, assets exceeded liabilities by \$3,765,800 at the close of the most recent fiscal year.

Investment in capital assets (e.g., land, buildings and improvements, furniture and equipment), less any related debt used to acquire those assets that are still outstanding represent 51 percent of the District's net assets. The District uses these capital assets to provide services to students; consequently, these assets are *not* available for future spending. Although the District's investment in its capital assets is reported net of related debt, it should be noted that the resources needed to repay this debt must be provided from other sources, since the capital assets themselves cannot be used to liquidate these liabilities.

The remaining balance of *unrestricted net assets* (\$1,829,511) may be used to meet the District's ongoing obligations to students and creditors.

**Governmental activities.** Governmental activities decreased the District's net assets by \$3,946. Key elements of the changes are as follows:

Revenues are generated primarily from two sources. Grants and contributions (program and general revenues totaling \$2,104,851) represent 65 percent of total revenues and property taxes (\$1,034,190) represent 32 percent of total revenues. The remaining 3 percent is generated from investment earnings, charges for services and miscellaneous revenues. The largest decrease in revenues, \$97,348, was in charges for services due to prior year revenues included insurance recoveries.

The primary functional expense of the District is instruction (\$1,613,982) which represents 50 percent of total expenses. Plant maintenance and operations (\$362,507) represents 11 percent of total expenses. General administration (\$307,584) represents 10 percent of total expenses. The remaining functional categories of expenses are individually less than 10 percent of total expenditures. Expenditure decreased slightly by \$28,086, which was due primarily to a decrease in plant maintenance and operations.

#### Financial Analysis of the Government's Funds

As noted earlier, the District uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

Governmental funds. The focus of the District's governmental funds is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows, and balances of spendable resources. Such information is useful in assessing the District's financing requirements. In particular, unreserved fund balance may serve as a useful measure of a District's net resources available for spending at the end of the fiscal year.

As of the end of the current fiscal year, the District's governmental funds reported combined ending fund balances of \$1,648,588 a decrease of \$125,655 in comparison with the prior year.

The general fund is the chief operating fund of the District. At the end of the current fiscal year, unreserved fund balance of the general fund was \$500,449, while total fund balance reached \$1,608,833. As a measure of the general fund's liquidity, it may be useful to compare both unreserved fund balance and total fund balance to total fund expenditures. Unreserved fund balance represents 19 percent of total general fund expenditures, while total fund balance represents 62 percent of that same amount. The fund balance of the District's general fund decreased by \$131,010 during the current fiscal year. For the most part, the decrease in fund balance was due to the decrease in state funds and the increase in functional expenditures, primarily school leadership.

The Summer Youth Program/DETCOG fund did not have a fund balance at year-end because program expenditures are reimbursed per the grant contract.

#### General Fund Budgetary Highlights

The District made several supplemental budgetary appropriations thoughout the year. The net change in budgetary appropriations made in the general fund was an increase totaling \$17,450 which was primarily to increase appropriations for school leadership, cocurricular/extracurricular activities, and general administration.

Significant differences between the final amended budget and actual amount can be briefly summarized as follows:

- Actual Revenues, when compared to the final budgeted amount, had a \$80,639 negative variance primarily due to a decrease in Local and Intermediate Sources.
- Actual Expenditures, when compared to the final budgeted amount, had a \$28,723 positive variance primarily due to unused appropriations in Student Transportation and Plant Maintenance and Operations.

#### **Capital Asset and Debt Administration**

Capital assets. The District's investment in capital assets for its governmental type activities as of August 31, 2010, amounts to \$2,067,255 (net of accumulated depreciation). This investment in capital assets includes land, buildings and improvements and furniture and equipment. The total decrease in the District's investment in capital assets for the current fiscal year was 1 percent.

Major capital asset additions during the current fiscal year included the following:

• \$82,528 Food Service Equipment

**Noncurrent Liabilities.** At the end of the current fiscal year, the District had total noncurrent liabilities outstanding of \$149,888, which consisted of bonds and notes payable and compensated absences.

The District's bonds and notes payable decreased by \$98,206 (44 percent) during the current fiscal year.

State statutes do not limit the rate or amount for the support of school district's bonded indebtedness.

Additional information on the District's long-term debt can be found in the notes to the financial statements as indicated in the table of contents of this report.

#### **Economic Factors and Next Year's Budgets and Rates**

- Current enrollment totals 242 students.
- District staff totals 47 employees, which consist of 22 teachers and 11 teachers' aides and secretaries.
- The District maintains 3 campuses for instruction.
- The unemployment rate for the County is currently 10.0 percent, which is a decrease from a rate of 10.3 percent a year ago. This compares unfavorably to the state's average unemployment rate of 8.3 percent, which is an increase from a rate of 8.1 percent a year ago.
- · Property values of the district are projected to increase 6 percent from the prior year.
- A maintenance and operations tax rate of \$1.04 was adopted for 2010-2011. Preceding year rate was \$1.04.

All of these factors were considered in preparing the District's budget for the 2011 fiscal year.

During the current fiscal year, unreserved fund balance in the general fund increased to \$500,449. The District plans to utilize unreserved fund balance to fund current expenditures prior to collecting the current year tax Jevy.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AUGUST 31, 2010

#### I. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### A. Reporting Entity

The Goodrich Independent School District (District) is governed by a seven-member board of trustees (Board), which has governance responsibilities over all activities related to public elementary and secondary education within the District. Because members of the Board are elected by the public; have authority to make decisions; appoint management and significantly influence operations; and have primary accountability for fiscal matters; the District is not included in any other governmental reporting entity. The accompanying financial statements present the District. There are no component units, entities for which the District is considered to be financially accountable, included within the reporting entity.

District receives funding from local, state, and federal government sources and must comply with the requirements of these funding source entities.

#### B. Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the statement of net assets and the statement of activities) report information on all of the nonfiduciary activities of the primary government. For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements. *Governmental activities* normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment are offset by program revenues. *Direct expenses* are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. Depreciation expense has been allocated to all applicable functions in order to present the expenditures of the District more accurately in the Statement of Activities. *Program revenues* include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or segment and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as *general revenues*.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds and fiduciary fund, even though the latter are excluded from the government-wide financial statements. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

#### C. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting, and Financial Statement Presentation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting, as is the fiduciary fund financial statement. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year for which they are levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the *current financial resources measurement focus* and the *modified accrual basis of accounting*. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be *available* when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the District considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures, as well as expenditures related to claims and judgments, are recorded only when payment is due.

Grant revenues and interest associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period. All other revenue items are considered to be measurable and available only when cash is received by the District.

The District reports the following major governmental funds:

The *general fund* is the District's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the general government, except those required to be accounted for in other funds.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AUGUST 31, 2010

The Summer Youth Program/DETCOG special revenue fund is used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources that are legally restricted to expenditures for specific purposes. These funds provide activities for at risk and older Americans.

Additionally, the District reports the following fund type:

The agency fund is used to account for assets held by the District as an agent for student organizations. The fund is custodial in nature (assets equal liabilities) and does not involve measurement or results of operation.

As a general rule, the effect of interfund activity has been eliminated from the government-wide financial statements.

Amounts reported as *program revenues* include 1) charges to customers or applicants for goods, services, or privileges provided and 2) operating grants and contributions. Internally dedicated resources are reported as *general revenues* rather than as program revenues. Likewise, general revenues include all taxes.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the District's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

## D. Assets, Liabilities, and Net Assets or Equity

#### 1. Deposits and Investments

The District's cash and cash equivalents are considered to be cash on hand and demand or time deposits. Current investments include investment pools and short-term investments with original maturities of one year or less from the date of acquisition.

The District's funds are required to be deposited and invested under the terms of a depository contract pursuant to the Texas School Depository Act. The depository bank pledges collateral, which complies with state law. The collateral is approved by the Texas Education Agency and shall be in an amount sufficient to protect District funds on a day-to-day basis during the period of the contract. The pledge of collateral is waived only to the extent of the depository bank's dollar amount of Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation ("FDIC") insurance.

State statutes authorize the District to invest in obligations of the U.S. Treasury or the State of Texas, certain U.S. Agencies, certificates of deposit, money market savings accounts, certain municipal securities, repurchase agreements, or investment pools.

Investments for the District are reported at fair value. The investment pools operate in accordance with appropriate state laws and regulations. The reported value of the pools is the same as the fair value of the pool shares.

#### 2. Receivables and Payables

Activity between funds that are representative of lending/borrowing arrangements outstanding at the end of the fiscal year are referred to as either "due to/from other funds" (i.e., the current portion of interfund loans) or "advances to/from other funds" (i.e., the non-current portion of interfund loans). All other outstanding balances between funds are reported as "due to/from other funds."

Advances between funds, as reported in the fund financial statements, are offset by a fund balance reserve account in applicable governmental funds to indicate that they are not available for appropriation and are not expendable available financial resources.

All property tax receivables are shown net of an allowance for uncollectible. The property tax receivable allowance is equal to 6 percent of outstanding property taxes at August 31, 2010. Revenues from property taxes are recognized when levied to the extent they are available. The District considers property taxes as available when collected. However, not all outstanding property taxes are expected to be collected within one year of the date of the financial statements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AUGUST 31, 2010

Property values are determined by the County Central Appraisal District as of January 1 of each year. Prior to September 1 of each year, the District must adopt its annual budget and as soon thereafter as practicable, shall adopt a tax rate thus creating the tax levy. Property taxes for the current calendar year are levied on approximately October 1 of each year and are payable by January 31 of the following year. Property tax receivables are recorded as of the date levied. Unpaid taxes become delinquent on February 1 and a tax lien on real property is created as of July 1 of each year.

#### 3. Inventories and Deferred Expenses

All inventories are valued at cost using the first-in first-out (FIFO) method. Inventories of governmental funds are recorded as expenditures when consumed rather than when purchased. Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as deferred expenses in both government-wide and fund financial statements.

#### 4. Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include land, buildings and improvements, furniture and equipment, and infrastructure assets (e.g., roads, bridges, sidewalks, and similar items), are reported in the governmental column in the government-wide financial statements. The District's infrastructure includes roads and parking lots associated with various buildings. The cost of the infrastructure was initially capitalized with the building cost and is being depreciated over the same useful life as the building. Capital assets are defined by the District as assets with an initial, individual cost which equals or exceeds \$5,000 (amount not rounded) and an estimated useful life in excess of two years. Such assets are recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost if purchased or constructed. Donated capital assets are recorded at estimated fair market value at the date of donation.

The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend assets lives are not capitalized.

Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed.

Buildings, furniture and equipment of the District are depreciated using the straight line method over the following estimated useful lives:

#### 5. Compensated Absences

It is the District's policy to permit employees to accumulate earned by unused sick leave benefits. Payment for unused sick leave days accumulated locally will be made upon retirement (in accordance with guidelines established by the Teacher Retirement System of Texas) for professional personnel. All sick pay is accrued when incurred (employee is eligible for retirement) in the government-wide financial statements. A liability for these amounts is reported in governmental funds only if they have matured, for example, the result of employee terminations.

The District does not have a liability for unpaid vacation at year end due to the District's policy does not allow a carryover of vacation not taken at August 31.

#### 6. Long-term Obligations

In the government-wide financial statements, long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the applicable governmental activities. Bond premiums and discounts are deferred and amortized over the life of the bonds using the bonds outstanding method, which approximates the effective interest method. Bonds payable are reported net of the applicable bond premium or discount. Bond issuance costs are reported as deferred charges and amortized over the term of the related debt.

In the fund financial statements, governmental fund types recognize bond premiums and discounts, as well as bond issuance costs, during the current period. The face amount of debt issued is reported as other financing sources. Premiums received on debt issuances are reported as other financing sources while discounts on debt issuances are reported as other financing uses. Issuance costs, whether or not withheld from the actual debt proceeds received, are reported as debt service expenditures. Bond proceeds are reported as an other financing source net of the applicable premium or discount and issuance costs.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AUGUST 31, 2010

#### 7. Fund Equity

In the fund financial statements, governmental funds report reservations of fund balance for amounts that are not available for appropriation or are legally restricted by outside parties for use for a specific purpose. Designations of fund balance represent tentative management plans that are subject to change.

#### 8. Use of Estimates

The presentation of financial statements, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### 9. Data Control Codes

The Data Control Codes refer to the account code structure prescribed by TEA in the *Financial Accountability System Resource Guide*. Texas Education Agency requires school districts to display these codes in the financial statements filed with the Agency in order to insure accuracy in building a statewide data base for policy development and funding plans.

## II. Stewardship, Compliance, and Accountability

#### A. Budgetary Information

Annual budgets are adopted on a basis consistent with generally accepted accounting principles for the general fund and National School Breakfast and Lunch Program special revenue fund. All other governmental funds adopt project-length budgets. All annual appropriations lapse at fiscal year end. The following procedures are followed in establishing the budgetary data reflected in the financial statements.

- Prior to August 20 of the preceding fiscal year, the District prepares a budget for the next succeeding fiscal year beginning September 1. The operating budget includes proposed expenditures and the means of financing them.
- 2. A meeting of the Board is then called for the purpose of adopting the proposed budget after ten days' public notice of the meeting has been given.
- 3. Prior to September 1, the budget is legally enacted through passage of a resolution by the Board.

The appropriated budget is prepared by fund, function, and campus/department. The District's campus/department heads may make transfers of appropriations within a department. Transfers of appropriations between campus/departments require the approval of the District's management. Transfers of appropriations between functions require the approval of the Board. The legal level of budgetary control (i.e., the level at which expenditures may not legally exceed appropriations) is the function level. The District made several supplemental budgetary appropriations throughout the year. The supplemental budgetary increases made in the General Fund totaled \$17,450. The increases were primarily to school leadership, cocurricular/extracurricular activities and general administration.

The supplemental budgetary increases made in the National School Breakfast and Lunch Program totaled \$6,000. The supplemental budgetary appropriations made in the National School Breakfast/Lunch Program special revenue fund were to appropriate funds for the purchase of additional food supplies.

#### **B. Excess of Expenditures Over Appropriations**

For the year ended August 31, 2010, expenditures exceeded appropriations in the function (the legal level of budgetary control) of the following fund:

Interest rate risk. In accordance with its investing policy, the District manages its exposure to declines in fair values by limiting the weighted average maturity of its investment portfolio not to exceed one year.

Credit risk. For fiscal year 2010, the District invested in Lone Star Investment Pool. Lone Star Investment Pool is duly chartered by the State of Texas Interlocal Cooperation Act and is administered by First Public, LLC. formerly the Texas Association of School Boards Financial Services. The District's investments in Lone Star Investment Pool were rated AAAm (Corporate Overnight Fund) by Standard & Poor's Investors Service.

Concentration of credit risk. The District's investment policy does not limit an investment in any one issuer.

Custodial credit risk – deposits. In the case of deposits, this is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the District's deposits may not be returned to it. As of August 31, 2010, District's bank balance was not exposed to custodial credit risk because it was insured and collateralized with securities held by the District's agent and in the District's name.

Custodial credit risk – investments. For an investment, this is the risk that, in the event of the failure of the counterparty, the District will not be able to recover the value of its investments or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. The District is not exposed to custodial risk due to the investments are insured or registered in the District's name or the investments are held by the District or its agent.

#### IV. Other Information

#### A. Risk Management Health Care Coverage

During the year ended August 31, 2010, the District contributed \$150 per month per employee towards the cost of health care for those who elected to participate in the TRS health care plan.

## Workers' Compensation, Unemployment Compensation and Property/Liability Losses

The District participates in the Texas Association of School Boards Risk Management Fund ("Fund") Workers' Compensation, Unemployment Compensation and Property/Liability Program. The Fund was created to formulate, develop and administer a program of modified self-funding for the Fund's membership, obtain competitive costs for coverages and develop a comprehensive loss control program. The District pays an annual premium to the Fund for its coverages and transfers the risk to the Fund. In the event that the Fund was to discontinue operations, the member districts would be responsible for any eligible claims not funded by the pool. There were no significant reductions in insurance coverage from the prior year or settlements exceeding insurance coverage for each of the past three fiscal years.

#### **B.** Contingent Liabilities

Amounts received or receivable from grant agencies are subject to audit and adjustment by grantor agencies, principally the federal government. Any disallowed claims, including amounts already collected, may constitute a liability of the applicable funds. The amount, if any, of expenditures that may be disallowed by the grantor cannot be determined at this time, although the District expects such amounts, if any, to be immaterial.

#### C. Joint Venture-Shared Service Arrangement

The District participates in the following shared service arrangements:

#### San Jacinto Shared Services - Special Needs Cooperative

The District participates in a shared service arrangement for special education funded under IDEA-B Formula and Preschool and State Supplemental Special Education Funds with other school districts. The District does not account for revenues or expenditures in these programs and does not disclose them in these financial statements. The revenues and expenditures are disclosed in the financial statements of the fiscal agent, Shepherd I.S.D. The District neither has a joint ownership interest in fixed assets purchased by the fiscal agent, nor does the District have a net equity interest in the fiscal agent. The fiscal agent is neither accumulating significant financial resources nor fiscal exigencies that would give rise to a future additional benefit or burden to the District. The fiscal agent manager is responsible for all financial activities of the shared service arrangement.

## Title III, Part A, English Language Acquisition and Language Enhancement

The District participates in a shared service arrangement for the improvement of the education of limited English proficient children funded under ESEA Title III, Part A, English Language Acquisition and Language Enhancement. The District neither has a joint ownership interest in fixed assets purchased by the fiscal agent, Education Service Center, Region VI, nor does the District have a new equity interest in the fiscal agent. The fiscal agent is neither accumulating significant financial resources nor fiscal exigencies that would give rise to a future additional benefit or burden to the District. The fiscal agent is responsible for part of the financial activities of the shared services arrangement.

#### Title II, Basic Grant Career and Technology Education Program

The District participates in a shared service arrangement for the education of career and technology students, funded under Title II, Basic Grant Career and Technology Education program. The District neither has a joint ownership interest in fixed assets purchased by the fiscal agent, Education Service Center, Region VI, nor does the District have a new equity interest in the fiscal agent. The fiscal agent is neither accumulating significant financial resources nor fiscal exigencies that would give rise to a future additional benefit or burden to the District. The fiscal agent is responsible for part of the financial activities of the shared services arrangement.

#### D. Defined Benefit Pension Plan

#### Pension Plan for Employees Participating in Teacher Retirement System

Plan Description. The Goodrich Independent School District contributes to the Teacher Retirement System of Texas (TRS), a cost-sharing multiple employer defined benefit pension plan. TRS administers retirement and disability annuities, and death and survivor benefits to employees and beneficiaries of the employees of the public school systems of Texas. It operates primarily under the provisions of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI, Sec. 67, and Texas Government Code, Title 8, Subtitle C. TRS also administers proportional retirement benefits and service credit transfer under Texas Government Code, Title 8, Chapter 803 and 805, respectively. The Texas state legislature has the authority to establish and amend benefit provisions of the pension plan and may, under certain circumstances, grant special authority to the TRS Board of Trustees. TRS issues a publicly-available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the defined benefit pension plan. That report may be obtained by writing to the TRS Communications Department, 1000 Red River Street, Austin, Texas 78701, by calling the TRS Communications Department at 1-800-223-8778, or by downloading the report from the TRS Internet website, <a href="https://www.trs.state.tx.us">www.trs.state.tx.us</a>, under the TRS Publications heading.

Funding Policy. Contribution requirements are not actuarially determined but are established and amended by the Texas state legislature. The state funding policy is as follows: (1) the state constitution requires the legislature to establish a member contribution rate of not less than 6.0% of the member's annual compensation and a state contribution rate of not less than 6.0% and not more than 10% of the aggregate annual compensation of all members of the system; (2) a state statute prohibits benefit improvements or contribution reductions if, as a result of the particular action(s), the time required to amortize TRS's unfunded actuarial liabilities would be increased to a period that exceeds 31 years, or, (3) if the amortization period already exceeds 31 years, the period would be increased by such action. State law provides for a member contribution rate of 6.4% for fiscal year 2010, 2009, and 2008 and a state contribution rate of 6.644% for the period January through August 2010, 6.4% for the period September through December 2009, and 6.58% for fiscal year 2009 and 2008. State contributions to TRS made on behalf of the Goodrich Independent School District's employees for the years ended August 31, 2010, 2009, and 2008 were \$91,212, \$94,740, and \$94,750, respectively. The District paid additional state contributions for the years ended August 31, 2010, 2009, and 2008 in the amount of \$15,932, \$15,429, and \$11,638, respectively, on the portion of the employees' salaries that exceeded the statutory minimum.

#### E. School District Retiree Health Plan

Plan Description. The Goodrich Independent School District contributes to the Texas Public School Retired Employees Group Insurance Program (TRS-Care), a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit postemployment health care plan administered by the Teacher Retirement System of Texas. TRS-Care provides health care coverage for certain persons (and their dependents) who retired under the Teacher Retirement System of Texas. The statutory authority for the program is Texas Insurance Code, Chapter 1575. Section 1575.052 grants the TRS Board of Trustees the authority to establish and amend basic and optional group insurance coverage for participants. The TRS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for TRS-Care. That report may be obtained by visiting the TRS Web site at <a href="https://www.trs.state.tx.us">www.trs.state.tx.us</a> under the TRS Publications heading, by writing to the Communications Department of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas at 1000 Red River Street, Austin, Texas 78701, or by calling 1-800-223-8778.

Funding Policy. Contribution requirements are not actuarially determined but are legally established each biennium by the Texas Legislature. Texas Insurance Code, Sections 1575.202, 203, and 204 establish state, active employee and public school contributions, respectively. The State of Texas and active public school employee contribution rates were 1.0% and 0.65% of public school payroll, respectively, with school districts

contributing a percentage of payroll set at 0.55% for fiscal years 2010, 2009 and 2008. Per Texas Insurance Code, Chapter 1575, the public school contribution may not be less than 0.25% or greater than 0.75% of the salary of each active employee of the public school. For the years ended August 31, 2010, 2009, and 2008, the States contributions to TRS-Care were \$15,242, \$16,216, and \$14,231, respectively, the active member contributions were \$10,514, \$10,541, and \$10,163, respectively, and the District's contributions were \$8,897, \$8,919, and \$8,600, respectively, which equaled the required contributions each year. In addition, the State of Texas contributed \$3,926, \$3,466, and \$3,402 in 2010, 2009 and 2008, respectively, for on-behalf payments for Medicare Part D.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

## Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the District's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control over financial reporting.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses and therefore, there can be no assurance that all deficiencies, significant deficiencies or material weaknesses have been identified. However, as described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs, we identified a certain deficiency in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be a material weakness.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. We consider the deficiency, 2010-1, described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs to be a material weakness.

#### Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the District's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed an instance of noncompliance or other matters that is required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards* and which is described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as item 2010-1.

The District's response to the finding identified in our audit is described in the accompanying corrective action plan. We did not audit the District's response and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management, the Board of Trustees, others within the entity, federal awarding agencies, and pass-through entities, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

## SECTION II -FINANCIAL STATEMENT FINDINGS

### 2010-1 Competitive Bidding

Criteria or Specific Requirement: In accordance with Texas Education Agency requirements for competitive bidding, all contracts valued at \$50,000 or more must be procured utilizing competitive bidding, except contracts for the purchase of produce or vehicle fuel.

Condition: The District failed to comply with state competitive bidding requirements for the purchase of food service equipment.

Context: The District had one vendor which exceeded the state threshold, \$50,000, which required competitive bidding. In performing our tests of bidding, we noted that the District did not obtain competitive bids as required by State law.

Effect: Failure to properly procure goods and services can result in the purchase of goods and services for more than necessary or market prices.

Cause: The District failed to identify vendors that would provide the most advantageous prices for the equipment.

Recommendation: Develop and implement controls to ensure that purchasing and budget managers comply with all state and federal requirements. Documentation should be maintained to support that these procedures were performed.

Views of responsible officials and planned corrective actions: See corrective action plan.
